

Singer-songwriter-guitarist Marsha Goodman-Wood, a former cognitive neuroscientist (!), and the Positrons (noted bassist Wardell Howell Jr. and multi-instrumentalists Ayanna Gallant and Kristen Arant) serve up science with an infectious rock 'n roll beat. Goodman-Wood tunefully offers real information-about such things as the difference between giant and colossal squid, Monarch butterfly migration, Pluto's demotion from planet status, metallurgy ("The Ore Song," with homophonic wordplay), gamma rays and radioactive decay. Woven throughout with humorous asides, the songs offer uplifting messages, too: "Don't be electrons, always negative; you could be like protons and stay positive; or be like positrons, fight the negativity, neutralize, chin up and rise, make the world a better place to be ... " For silly fun, the imagination-celebrating, alphabet song, "Alien in an Ambulance," is sung from a fanciful kid's point of view: "I saw an alien in an ambulance ... a cat in a cab ... a dog in a dumptruck ... an elephant riding an escalator," all the way to a "zebra in a Zamboni." Other fine musicians on the album: Ford Combs, Billy Kelly, children's artists Barry Louis Polisar and Lori Henriques; and the album's producer, TJ Lipple.

This 12-track album skillfully weaves science with themes of friendship and kindness, underscored with an infectious rock beat. Playful, educational, and engaging, this record features collaborations with other children's musicians such as Barry Louis Polisar, Lori Henriques and Billy Kelly. Produced by talented indie rocker, TJ Lipple.

"Antimatter exists/Quantum Physics is real" - not very many singers, let alone children's musicians, could make this sophisticated lyric sound matter-of-fact and melodic, but Marsha Goodman-Wood does so on the track, "Positrons," which posits all types of scientific terms in a kid-friendly way. Goodman-Wood and her band do a superb job conveying some very heady ideas in clever, tuneful ways that will entertain listeners of all ages. With their jazz-flavored, poppy rock sound, Marsha And The Positrons sing about squids to offer a lesson on invertebrate creatures and about a sneezing cat to discuss being sensitive to others' allergies, as well as exploring the "mysteries" of garbage and recyclables collections. "Alien in an Ambulance," another album highlight, is a wonderfully wacky tune filled with excellent alphabet-centric wordplay."
